

A Bessing in Disguise

Oscar Wilde said, "what seems to us as bitter trials are often blessings in disguise." In the case of the Pecqueur family from Charlotte, NC, that adage could not have been more true.

Like many couples, Wendy and Alex Pecqueur struggled to get pregnant. After a year of blood work, ultrasounds and fertility treatments, Wesley was conceived, only to be born prematurely at 25 weeks. For 103 days, the Pecqueurs traveled in an endless loop between home, work and visiting Wesley in the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) – where extensive blood work revealed that Wesley's neutrophil counts were very low. On the day Wesley was discharged – coincidentally on his actual due date, Wesley was referred to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital's hematology clinic for further testing. After months of blood draws and bone marrow biopsies, Wesley was diagnosed with severe congenital neutropenia, a very rare disease in which the body stops producing infection-fighting white blood cells; his immune system was broken.


"Wesley's condition is difficult to detect, with a 70% mortality rate in the first year of life without medical intervention. If not for the constant blood work in the NICU, doctors likely would have missed the irregular pattern in his blood counts. We could never have imagined that being born prematurely most likely saved his life," says Wendy. Early detection enabled Wesley to begin injections three times a week with a very expensive medication typically administered to cancer patients following chemotherapy to help build the immune system. After a year of treatment, however, the medication stopped working; a bone marrow transplant would be needed. If a donor match could be found, Wesley would become the first child at his hospital to receive a transplant for congenital neutropenia.

Because Wendy and Alex were not good enough matches, Wesley went into the bone marrow donor database. Relatively quickly, a perfect match was found. However, three weeks before Wesley was to begin his pre-op regimen, the donor backed out. By then, Wesley's condition had worsened, causing frequent bacterial infections. Their luck changed a few weeks later when an English teacher from Germany flew to the U.S. for the surgery. The Pecqueurs each took a leave of absence from work to move to their transplant city for four months, and Wesley began aggressive chemotherapy to prepare for the procedure. On July 2, 2019, just one month before his second birthday, Wesley received a life-saving bone marrow transplant.

"The transplant process was very difficult to watch as a parent; we had never felt so helpless in our lives," says Wendy. "There was nothing we could do but comfort Wesley and trust that the doctors were doing the right thing." After six weeks of living in the hospital as Wesley endured aggressive follow-up chemo, Wendy and Alex received training on how to care for Wesley's central lines and administer IV's, and the family moved into the Ronald McDonald House. After nine months of treatment and isolation due to the transplant, the family's restrictions ended in February 2020...only for the pandemic to hit a few weeks later, sending the family back into isolation for 14 more months.

In May 2021, Wesley was well enough to attend pre-school; and in January 2023, he and his parents took the trip of a lifetime to Give Kids The World Village as part of Wesley's wish to visit Walt Disney World. "These kids lose a big piece of their childhoods when they live in hospitals and doctors' offices for portions of their lives; our stay at Give Kids The World Village gave him a little of that back," says Wendy. "The Village is truly a child's paradise, and Wesley loved every minute – from the rides, parties and horseback riding to eating more ice cream than any one human should probably consume in a week! The moment I will always remember was seeing Wesley's star placed in the castle where it will live forever. It was very emotional to be able to close that chapter of our lives with a child who not only survived his disease but is currently thriving."





"Our family is eternally grateful to the Village for their kindness and generosity," says Alex. "Give Kids The World made our son's wildest dreams come true and treated us to a truly amazing experience, beyond our expectations. The resort itself is stunning, a genuine wonderland for kids. Paying It Forward

Volunteering on behalf of critically ill children is very close to the hearts of the Noorlander family. After surviving a stage 4 Wilms tumor at the age of two, 19-year-old Amanda – a sophomore at Florida Atlantic University – now has thyroid cancer, with surgery planned for November. Four years ago at the age of 11, Amanda's brother, Paul, and their mother. RoxAnne, moved to Philadelphia for one year as he received a bone marrow transplant from a then-unknown donor, who has since become part of the family. In 2021, the Noorlanders invited the donor and his family to join them at Night of a Million Lights, and the passion they felt for the mission was instantaneous; the entire family signed up to volunteer. Since then, the family has devoted hundreds of hours giving back and inspiring wish families with their



own stories of survival. Paul has volunteered more than 155 hours in the past two years; while Amanda, who is fluent in American Sign Language, loves to use her skills signing the star experience for wish families in the Castle of Miracles.

"Volunteering at Give Kids The World has helped me heal," says RoxAnne. "As someone who has been there twice and now a third time with my daughter's cancer, I have unique insight into what wish families are going through; being able to comfort them when they need it means so much to me and my family. Give Kids The World taught all of us the true meaning of giving back." In addition to volunteering their time, the Noorlanders collect books for the on-site lending libraries at the Village.
